Our Parenting Orders Program (POP) is designed to assist separated families who are experiencing high conflict. I enhances parental communication & conflict management skills; refocusing on the best interests of the child. The program provides therapeuticleducational group work for parents & children, information & referral, counselling or individual support, joint sessions & child consultations. The program consists of 3 main elements:

Parent group work + Childrens group work + Family Counselling.

BUILDING BETTER BRIDGES

POP runs a five week adult group called Building Better Bridges. These groups are delivered during each school term over 5 consecutive weeks. The course is a therapeutic educational model that offers the erapeuric educational moder that cher's the poportunity for premists to share experiences & receive upport from other parents in similar situations. The pics covered in the group are aimed at families who re experiencing high conflict in regard to parenting trangements, with or without Family Law Court volvement. Topics covered are:

- Child development & the impact of ongoing conflic Conflict resolution & problem solving Effective communication post separation Stress management & taking care of yourself

BATTERY COLLECTION AND RECYCLING PROGRAM

Batteries contain harmful substances including mercury, cadmium and lead. These chemicals and materials can be dangerous if mixed with other waste streams and cause damage to the environment if placed in landfill.

To help keep batteries out of landfill and encourage everyone to recycle batteries, Close the Loop offers a national battery recycling service for everyone. The different types of both single-use batteries and rechargeable batteries that we collect and recycle are listed below.

- Lead Acid (Pb)
- Nickel Cadmium (NiCad), sealed & vented
- · Lithium-Ion Lithium-Ion Polymer
- Lithium Batteries
- Alkaline Batteries
- Nickel Metal Hydride (Ni-MH)
- Single-use Batteries
- Rechargeable Batteries
- Household Batteries

The four proficiencies are:

- Understanding: ability to describe the what and how of mathematics; e.g. able to explain why 2/4 is equivalent to one half
- Fluency: ability to choose appropriate procedures;
 e.g. able calculate percentage discounts
- Problem Solving: ability to apply existing strategies to seek solutions and verify answers; e.g. organise a list to show how many combinations are possible using four different ice cream flavours
- Reasoning: ability for logical thought and actions;
 e.g. identifies and justifies what number would be the next in a pattern.
