

### PRINCIPAL REPORT

I cannot believe we are at the end of the term. It has been a long term, but I am pleased to say that after spending a majority of the term setting clear expectations for our students and teaching them the routines of our workshop model in reading, writing and mathematics, students are making great learning growth.

A focus for term two in the teaching and learning space will be targeted teaching, ensuring that as part of our workshop model we are still spending time teaching small groups of students with identified similar needs. This may be to extend them or it may be to develop a stronger understanding of the key concepts being taught.

We are also strengthening our collaborative planning through the engagement of teaching partnerships with the Department and two key workers in Shelley Gilbert and Megan Teefey will continue to support the development of quality planning for the remainder of the year.



## Tutor Learning Initiative

In Term Two, we will launch into our Tutor Learning Initiative. This will see Mrs Mooney tutoring students in reading, writing and mathematics Monday through Thursday and Ms Grogan will continue her mathematics tutoring with students in Year 5 and 6. For a small school we are able to provide additional targeted teaching to over 50 students from Year 2/3 class to 56 classes. Parents will be informed this week of which students we are offering additional support too. We are continuing our focus on learning growth, some students who are above expected level or at expected level, but have made low growth over the past 12 months will be our focus. This is a commitment we have made as a leadership team for 2023. In the lower end of the Primary we are supporting students to learn their sounds and blends through Sounds Write targeted teaching with Donna. I am proud of the individualised support we are able to offer our students to enable success for every learner.

## Staff Changes for Term 2:

I can confirm that after Term One I have reflected on the wellbeing needs of our students and making sure we are able to form strong partnerships in learning and wellbeing with our families. For the remainder of 2023, Ms Grogan will be continuing with her Inclusive Leadership role but 5 days a week instead of four. This means that Mrs Mooney will be stepping into the Foundation class on Friday's. This will allow Ms Grogan and I to allocate some more time to SWPBS Framework to develop and embed a whole school approach to supporting our students.

### Holiday Reading:

Students should be coming home with a HOLIDAY READING log this week. We are trying to increase the amount of students who read for 160 nights over the school year and holiday reading will count towards this target. It is a great way to maintain some routine with it being holidays.

## Athletics Day:

It was such a fantastic day and I want to congratulate all of the students for their effort and commitment to our Aths day. Thank you to the staff, especially Leanne Hadley for running such a great community event. To see so many parents and carers present was also a great indication of the strengthening partnerships we are developing with our wider community.


### Student Voice and Agency and SRC

# Auslan in Term One




This term all classes have been working hard to consolidate the key learnings for Auslan that we have been embedding over the last two years. It has been wonderful to see just how quickly students can now fingerspell words without designated signs, demonstrating their understanding of the fingerspelling alphabet. In the upper grades of 3-6 we are now developing the ability to connect words from many different 'sets' within Auslan so we can have conversations with one another, pose questions and provide answers to those queries. This might include describing how many pets a person has, the colour of those pets and the breeds. In other scenarios it might involve asking for help in a mock 'emergency situation'. Senior students are also using the signbank.org website to identify specific words that they would like to use in the sentences they wish to form.

In the junior school, the F-2 students continue to build up their understanding of how to sign numbers, colours and animals. They are also learning how to sign greetings such as good morning, afternoon and good night and they are learning the signs for family members so they will be able to share who makes up their family unit. We also take regular walks around the school to learn how to sign important locations and objects such as playground, toilets and trees.













### BATTERY COLLECTION AND RECYCLING PROGRAM

Batteries contain harmful substances including mercury, cadmium and lead. These chemicals and materials can be dangerous if mixed with other waste streams and cause damage to the environment if placed in landfill.

To help keep batteries out of landfill and encourage everyone to recycle batteries, Close the Loop offers a national battery recycling service for everyone. The different types of both single-use batteries and rechargeable batteries that we collect and recycle are listed below.
